#### Dear Citizens,

The opioid addiction continues to be the largest problem and the root of much of the crime in Washington County. We have been working with our Criminal Justice System partners to address this problem. We have made baby steps in improving the number of overdoses, but we have a long way to go to resolve the opioid crisis.

The Day Reporting Center (DRC) was established at the end of 2016 and continued to expand and grow throughout 2019. The Day Reporting Center also started providing services for clients from the Adult Drug Court in April 2019. The DRC also takes in clients who are on pretrial release to provide monitoring and services. In addition, we are working with the Department of Public Safety and Correctional Services to bring back inmates from the Division of Corrections as they are within a year of release back into our community. This will allow us to provide reentry services to these inmates to help them cope and reduce the potential for committing future crimes.

The Sheriff's Office has been working with our partners in Fire and Rescue to plan and construct a Public Safety Training Center where we train new recruits, do in-service training, and train with our other public safety partners to insure our response to any incident will be coordinated in an efficient and effective manner. The construction of the Public Safety Training Center began in October 2019 and will take approximately 18 months to complete.

The Sheriff's Office began a Law Enforcement Assisted Diversion (LEAD) Program with several our community partners to divert low-level offenders away from the criminal justice system and into community services where we feel there will be a better outcome. The victims and offenders both must agree to the LEAD Program before an offender is placed into the program.

The Sheriff's Office is also participating in a Juvenile Diversion program that allows our deputies to use discretion in diverting juveniles who have committed minor offenses, and have not been extensively involved in the Juvenile Justice System, into community programs that keeps them from having a juvenile criminal record but takes corrective actions to alter their criminal thinking.

Rest assured that the Washington County Sheriff's Office is doing everything within our power to provide a safe environment in which to live and work in Washington County.

#### TRAINING & RECRUITMENT

#### 2019 AT A GLANCE

- Numerous Patrol, Judicial and Detention personnel attended 2 job fairs to recruit applicants.
- Out of 83 applicants for Patrol or Judicial, 23 passed all testing phases and were placed on an eligibility list.
- During the year 2019, twenty Deputies and one Civilian were hired to fill positions at the Sheriff's Office.

#### SPECIALIZED TRAINING

#### **IN-SERVICE TRAINING**

Every police officer is mandated by the State of Maryland to successfully complete 18 hours of annual in-service training. Training topics included are:

- Tactical Medicine and Emergency First Aid
- Firearms Safety and Use of Force
- Defensive Tactics, Police Baton, O.C. Spray and Taser Certification
- Autism & Police Interaction
- Dealing with the Mentally ILL
- Handling Identity Theft
- Rape and Sexual Assault
- Child Exploitation
- Airport Security
- Agency All Hazard Plan
- Dealing with Sovereign Citizens

#### ENTRANCE LEVEL POLICE OFFICER

All newly hired Patrol Deputies must attend an entry-level police academy. Newly hired officers attend a Maryland Police and Correctional Training Certified Academy within Maryland.

#### FIELD TRAINING OFFICER

The Field Training Program requires a minimum of four months training. The recruit is assigned to work each day with a deputy that has received specialized training as a Field Training Officer (FTO). The FTO monitors, and mentors the recruit. A detailed progress and activity report is maintained and reviewed weekly by the patrol supervisor. Upon the recruit's successful completion of the FTO program, the Maryland Police Training Commission is notified in writing, and the recruit is then certified as a law enforcement officer.

#### FIREARMS QUALIFICATION

All Sheriff's Office Deputies are required to qualify annually with department issued handguns. A minimum of two hours of classroom instruction is mandated. The Deputy is then required to pass a live fire training course. The officer must qualify by scoring at least a 70% during both day light and reduced light firing. In addition to live fire each deputy is mandated to satisfactorily complete a firearms judgmental course. This training is provided by the use of a Firearms Training Simulator (F.A.T.S machine). This video-based simulation system gives the deputy different real-life scenarios. Using the F.A.T.S. machine, deputies must decide based on the circumstances if they should shoot a suspect or not. Each officer is also required to qualify with a department issued shotgun.

### NARCOTICS TASK FORCE (NTF)

#### 2019 AT A GLANCE

- ♦ Heroin and opiates continue to be the drugs most investigated by the Narcotics Task Force.
- Narcotics Task Force opened 398 investigations in 2019 which led to the arrests of 115 persons. The majority of the arrests involved distribution of Heroin (35), Fentanyl (31), Crack Cocaine (14), Powder Cocaine (12), and Marijuana (8).
- Narcotics Task Force responded to 329 heroin overdoses; of which 60 were fatal.
- Narcotics Task Force executed a total of 78 search and seizure warrants.
- Narcotics Task Force seized 28 firearms of various makes and models.
- ♦ Narcotics Task Force seized 3 vehicles and were awarded forfeiture by the Circuit Court of Washington County.
- Narcotics Task Force seized over \$167,000.00 in cash and assets.

#### GANG INVESTIGATION UNIT

#### 2019 AT A GLANCE

- ♦ The Gang Unit identified and validated approximately 68 total gang members and associates.
- Gang Unit provided 53 documented assists to State, Federal and local entities regarding gang information.
- 444 known gang members or associates were arrested for various crimes throughout Washington County in 2019.
- Gang Unit assisted Narcotics Task Force with numerous drug arrests where the targets were gang members or associates. The Gang Unit also assisted in and/or investigated numerous Heroin related overdoses.

#### K-9 Unit

The Washington County Sheriff's Office K-9 unit consists of (4) four WCSO deputies and their assigned K-9 partners, consisting of (2) two cross-trained German Sheppard patrol/detection K-9's, (1) one Labrador Retriever trained in narcotics detection, and (1) one Bloodhound trained in tracking/trailing of persons. In 2019 WCSO deployed their K-9's one hundred and seventy (170) times for various calls for service supporting WCSO and surrounding agencies. All WCSO K-9's and their partners certify annually with the North American Police Work Dog Association.

#### TRAFFIC / CRIMINAL INTERDICTION UNIT

#### TRAFFIC/CRIMINAL INTERDICTION UNIT

The Washington County Sheriffs Office Traffic / Criminal Interdiction Unit (TCIU) is comprised of four Sheriffs' Office deputies. Their duties and responsibilities include: to address on-going traffic safety problems identified through crash data analysis and complaints received from the citizens of Washington County through the use of selective enforcement activities, saturation patrols, and high visibility traffic enforcement.

Another duty is to utilize a problem oriented policing approach and address criminal activity through the use of proactive enforcement, criminal interdiction, and covert surveillance techniques in known locations in Washington County, Maryland. Lastly, to enforce Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) regulations by conducting commercial motor vehicle safety inspections in Washington County, Maryland.

#### **COMMUNITY DEPUTY PROGRAM**

The town of Williamsport has contracted the services of one Community Deputy, who acts as the town's police force and is supported by the Patrol Division during hours when the Community Deputy is not working. Deputy First Class Matthew Sullivan has been serving the town's people since December 2018. Dfc. Sullivan has developed a great working relationship with the Town of Williamsport Officials; which results in positive community relations with the town's people, businesses, and visitors of the many historic sites. Dfc. Sullivan actively participates in community events; such as National Night Out, The Williamsport Secret Santa, Christmas Parade Planning Committee, Canal Days, Trick or Treat Patrol, July 4th in Byron Park, and The Polar Bear Plunge, to name a few.

Since October 2018 three municipalities contracted with the Washington County Sheriff's Office for Police Protection Services for their citizens. The communities of Sharpsburg, Keedysville and Clear Spring joined together and share the services of Deputy First Class Tracey Peyton. Dfc. Peyton routinely patrols these areas; while responding to any calls for service. Dfc. Peyton serves as the towns police force and is supported by the Patrol Division during hours when he is not working.

#### SCHOOL RESOURCE DEPUTY PROGRAM

The Washington County Sheriff's Office and the Washington County Board of Education have partnered together to provide School Resource Deputies to schools in Washington County. School Resource Deputies are assigned to Clear Spring, Williamsport, Boonsboro and Smithsburg High Schools and provide coverage for the local Middle Schools and feeder elementary schools as well.

The School Resource Deputies provide security at their assigned schools, provide services to school staff dealing with disciplinary issues, criminal matters and counseling troubled students.

The **Washington County Special Response Team** is comprised of members of the Hagerstown Police Department and the Washington County Sheriff's Office. ### SEX OFFENDER REGISTRATION UNIT

#### 2019 AT A GLANCE

- On December 31, 2019, there were 173 Tier III offenders, 40 Tier II offenders and 44 Tier I offenders registered in Washington County
- ♦ All are male with the exception of 4 females.
- All reside in Washington County with the exception of 19 who reside out of state, but are employed in Washington County.
- ♦ In 2019, initial registrations were completed for 26 Tier III offenders, 5 Tier II offenders, 10 Tier I offenders, and no sexually violent predators.
- 5 persons were charged with various violations of the registry laws. Violations involved offenders failing to notify registry within 3 days of an address change and failure to register weekly as a homeless offender as required.
- The residence of each sex offender is verified once every 8 weeks. Approximately 1,113 address verifications were conducted in 2019.
- ◆ The Sheriff's Office processed 1,227 registration appointments in 2019.

#### SEX OFFENDER REGISTRATION

Tier I Sex Offender must register every six months for fifteen years. Some offenses are 4th Degree Sex Offense and Possession of Child Pornography.

Tier II Sex Offender must register every six months for twenty-five years. Some offenses are Distribution of Child Pornography, Sexual Solicitation of a Minor, 3rd Degree Sex Offense - Sexual Act (offender is at least four years older than victim) or Vaginal Intercourse (offender is at least twenty-one years old) which is a Statutory Offense where victim was a fourteen or fifteen year old.

Tier III Sex Offender is the most serious classification and must register every three months for life. Some offenses are Child Kidnapping, Rape 1st, 2nd, and 3rd Degree, 1st, 2nd, and 3rd Degree Sex Offenses, Sexual Abuse of a Minor, all Attempted Rapes and Sex Offenses.

**Sexually Violent Predator** registers every three months for life. This offender is convicted of a sexually violent offense and has been determined to be at risk of committing another sexually violent offense.

Homeless Offenders with no fixed address must report and register weekly.

#### CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION UNIT

#### 2019 AT A GLANCE

- ♦ 331 cases investigated by the Criminal Investigation Unit in 2019.
- ♦ 187 firearms seized during 2019 from the service of Protective Violence Orders.
- 57 firearms seized during 2019 from Emergency Risk Protective Orders.
- ♦ 136 firearms were returned after the protective violence orders expired in 2019.

#### **Computer Voice Stress Analyzer**

Select members of the Criminal Investigation Unit (3) have been specially trained in the use of a truth verification device; better known as a Computer Voice Stress Analyzer or C.V.S.A. The C.V.S.A. is an instrument or computer which records a person's voice and analyzes changes in voice pattern that have been scientifically proven to indicate deception.

During the calendar year 2019, a total of forty-two (42) C.V.S.A. tests were administered by our highly trained operators. Forty-one (41) persons were tested for pre-employment purposes and one (1) test was administered to a suspect in a criminal case.

#### **Digital Investigative Forensic Unit**

Two Detectives in 2018 received specialized training in the forensic examination of cellular telephones seized during criminal investigations. Specialized equipment was purchased through various grants to assist in retrieving this information. Detectives were able to gather invaluable information through these examinations that assisted in countless arrests and convictions of a multitude of different investigations. Their expertise and specialized equipment were also utilized by various outside police agencies as well. A total of eighty-eight (88) forensic cellular telephone examinations, thirty-seven (37) computer drive examinations, and forty-four (44) search warrants were performed during 2019; resulting in fifteen (15) arrests.







### POLICE COMMUNICATIONS AND CALLS STATISTICS







### DOMESTIC VIOLENCE UNIT




#### **CRIME ANALYST**

- The main purpose of the crime analyst position is to identify and forecast future crime patterns, series and trends.
- The Crime Analyst uses information from crime reports to prepare maps, crime bulletins, and tactical analysis on Part I Crime, (homicide, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft and arson).
- Analysis reports and recommendations are used by Command Staff and Patrol Division Supervisors to address crime trends.
- Acts as liaison with allied agency Crime Analysts and Criminal Investigators to share crime data and resources.

# BURGLAR ALARM RESPONSE



Out of 2,509 burglar and robbery alarms received in 2019, **0.3%** of all alarm activations were caused by actual criminal activity. The alarms were caused by severe weather conditions, negligence on the part of the alarm owner, or by accidental activation.




## UNIFORM CRIME REPORT (UCR)

### CENTRAL BOOKING

On May 10, 2010 Central Booking became fully operational. All police officers making an arrest in Washington County now bring their arrestee to the Central Booking facility. The officer completes the information for their charging document and turns the arrestee over to the Central Booking personnel and they then return to patrol our streets. This takes about 30 to 45 minutes as opposed to the 3 to 4 hours it previously took to process arrestees.

The Central Booking personnel complete the rest of the processing and walk the arrestee over to the District Court Commissioner's area for their hearing on commitment. The District Court Commissioners are located in the same facility as Central Booking. This means that the arrestee is transported to Central Booking from the site of arrest and then do not have to be transported any further. This provides a more efficient means of processing and limits the escape risk of individuals who are arrested.

The Central Booking Office processed 3,887 arrestees in 2019. Of the arrestees, 1,856 were committed to the Washington County Detention and 2,031 were released.

#### JUDICIAL SERVICES DIVISION

By law, the Sheriff of Washington County is charged with the responsibility of providing a safe environment for everyone (visitors, employees, witnesses, jurors, judges, prisoners, etc.) who enter the Circuit Courthouse located at the corner of Summit Ave. and W. Washington St. in Hagerstown, MD. In order to achieve these duties, the Sheriff has appointed a competent staff of sworn law-enforcement and court deputies, a security staff and civilian clerical personnel who are assigned to the Judicial Services Division.

#### **COURTHOUSE PROTECTION & SECURITY**

The Court Security Unit is responsible for maintaining a uniformed presence in and around the courthouse and screening all persons, packages and parcels entering the courthouse. This unit consists of two (2) Sergeants, four (4) uniformed law enforcement deputies, four (4) uniformed court security deputies and six (6) part-time civilian court security personnel.

Located inside the entrance to the courthouse is a "walk-through" metal detector and an x-ray machine, which is used to scan articles carried by persons entering the courthouse. This station is manned between 7:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. each day the courthouse is open. It is also manned and utilized during special events such as public meetings held in the courthouse after normal business hours. The Courthouse is also equipped with 96 closed-circuit cameras, which monitor courtrooms, offices and common areas. These cameras are monitored in the Control Center by one of the civilian court security personnel during business hours. The metal detector is staffed by two civilian court security personnel and a uniformed deputy sheriff. During 2019, a total of 97,922 people were screened entering the courthouse.

#### PRISONER TRANSPORT

A portion of the judicial personnel's duties involves the daily transportation of adult prisoners being held in the Detention Center to the Circuit Court for trial. Judicial personnel are also responsible for these prisoners while being detained in temporary holding cells located within the courthouse. Upon conviction, judicial personnel return these prisoners to the Detention Center.

#### **COURTROOM SECURITY**


There are six Circuit Court Judges who preside over trials involving civil, criminal and juvenile matters and a Family Law Master who conducts hearings on matters dealing with family law. Two deputies are assigned per court-room and one with the Master. It is felt the mere presence of the uniformed deputies provide a deterrent factor and has a tendency to maintain order during the trials.

#### **COUNTY ADMINISTRATION BUILDING SECURITY**


A deputy sheriff is assigned to provide security screening of visitors to the County Administration Building during business hours. Security is also provided for evening meetings when requested.

## CIVIL & CRIMINAL PROCESS

The Civil Process Unit is responsible for attempting and serving all civil summonses, subpoenas and writs received from the Circuit and District Courts. This unit is comprised of four (4) deputy sheriffs who serve Circuit Court paperwork and two (2) part-time civilian Process Servers (Constables) who serve District Court paperwork.

During the calendar year 2019, the Sheriff's Office received 18,611 summonses for service and served 16,722.





## CHILD SUPPORT ENFORCEMENT FEDERAL GRANT

Until July 1, 2001, the Sheriff's Office received \$30.00 per process (warrants & summons) served. On July 1, 2008, the County entered into a contract with the State of Maryland entitled "Actual Cost Reimbursement" which provides grant funding to the Child Support Unit, which is renewed each year. Two (2) full-time and one (1) half-time deputy sheriff positions are responsible for attempting and serving child support summonses and warrants and two (2) Office Associates are responsible for entering and maintaining those summonses and warrants.

The Child Support Unit is supervised by the Warrant Task Force supervisor and their warrant statistics are part of the overall W.T.F statistics.





## WARRANT TASK FORCE


The *Washington County Warrant Task Force* was formed on January 1, 2009. The Task Force is supervised by a Sergeant from the Sheriff's Office and consists of three Washington County Sheriff's Office deputies, two Hagerstown Police Department officers and one trooper from the Maryland State Police.


The Child Support Unit of the Sheriff's Office is also part of the Task Force, which consists of two deputies. Three civilian support staff members are responsible for receiving and the timely entry of all warrants and civil orders, which are maintained at the Sheriff's Office.

The Task Force is responsible for attempting and serving all warrants, criminal summonses and Peace Orders issued in Washington County and also those received from allied police agencies for persons living or working in Washington County. The Task Force is also responsible for all extraditions/transports of wanted persons who are located outside of Washington County.



## WASHINGTON COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE DETENTION DIVISION



#### **Points of Interest:**

The Washington County Detention Center houses inmates awaiting trial and those committed to the Detention Center who are serving sentences of 18 months or less. The Detention Center is the initial entry point for every person accused of committing a crime in Washington County—from minimum to maximum security inmates. Those sentenced to more than one year <u>may</u> serve their sentences at a state for federal institution however those sentenced to greater than 18 months <u>must</u> serve their sentence at the appropriate state or federal correctional institution.

The rated capacity for the Detention Center is 339 male general population and 48 female population inmates. Special Housing and Programs Unit capacity is 112 beds.

In 2019, the Detention Center housed an average of 311 inmates daily with a high of 324 inmates. In order to house our average daily population, Special Housing Units and the Intake Cells had to be utilized.





Training includes: CPR, Infectious Diseases, Defensive Tactics, Chemical Agents, First Aid, Dealing with Special Management Inmate, Self Defense, etc... After an officer completes the correctional academy they will spend an additional 240 hours with a Field Training Officer.




The **Security Staff** consists of 110 sworn uniformed correctional deputies. They provide security staffing over 3 shifts, 24 hours per day, 365 days per year. Each shift is comprised of a Lieutenant, who serves as the Shift Commander, two Sergeants/Corporals, and a number of DFC's and Deputies. ## INMATE PROGRAMS

**Home Detention**—allows inmates to serve their sentence in their homes via electronic monitoring and continue employment, educational classes and attend treatment.

**Work Release**—allows inmates to obtain or continue employment within the community while serving their sentence. Inmates on this program are allowed to leave the facility to go to work but must return when their work day is concluded. Work site supervision is supplied by employers along with site checks conducted by Detention Center staff.

To be considered for the above programs, inmates must be recommended by their sentencing judges to participate.

The charts below indicate how many inmates were recommended for Home Detention, Work Release, and Weekend Confinement from each court.

## DAY REPORTING CENTER PROGRAM

The Washington County Sheriff's Office, **Day Reporting Center** opened on October 1, 2017. The program is located on the grounds directly behind the County Detention Center and the Sheriff's Office. The day reporting center is alternative to incarceration for individuals committed to the Washington County Detention Center with a substance related criminal conviction. The Washington County Sheriff's Office Day Reporting Center is a six month, on-site, non-residential cognitive restructuring program designed to change an offender's adverse thinking patterns and attitudes, improve job skills and job retention. The individuals remains in the custody of the Washington County Detention Center, with a modified home detention privileges. The primary goals of the program is to reduce offender recidivism, improve offender's ability to conform to community norms, enhance coping skills, decrease substance relapse, increase employability, and increase job retention.

The program hours of operation are Monday through Friday 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. and Saturday 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. The program is closed on Sunday and major holidays. The program will blend a high level of supervision to include GPS (global positioning system), community surveillance and unannounced home visits, with intensive case management, and treatment for substance related disorders. The program uses cognitive behavioral therapy in group and individual settings, medication assisted treatment using Vivitrol, and random and rigorous alcohol and drug testing. In addition, the program provides health visits, reentry, peer recovery, soft and life skills, vocational assessments, employability, financial and emotional literacy, pro-social support, mediation, mentoring / coaching, and health and wellness services. The program provides job training for those with inadequate work skills and lack of stable employment. The program refers to community providers for mental health services.

The Washington County Health Department, Division of Behavioral Health Services, Jail **Substance Abuse Program (JSAP)** was established in 1989 as substance use disorder treatment program operating within the Washington County Detention Center. JSAP is accredited by the Commission on Accreditation for Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF). JSAP is also certified by the State of Maryland Department of Health, Office of Health Care Quality. The Program provides 2 hour daytime substance use treatment groups 2 times per week and individual counseling services for adults at WCDC.

Starting in 2020, a health and wellness group component will be added through Justice and Recovery Advocates, Inc. Naltrexone pharmacotherapy is offered to individuals with alcohol and/or opiate addiction if meeting criteria upon release. Counselors refer persons served to a community provider of their choice to continue with substance use treatment following release from incarceration. Additional services include evaluations to determine treatment amenability for individuals court ordered under HG Article 8505 and optional programs for parenting skills, Sexual Health in Recovery (SHIR), Overdose Response Training, and HIV testing.



#### **INMATE VISITING**

In July 2011, the Washington County Detention Center implemented a Video Visitation System for inmate visitation with family and friends. The Video Visitation System uses computer screens and telephones so that the inmate can remain on their housing unit but still be able to visit with their family and friends. Visitors must logon to the system to schedule their visit which allows them to visit at more convenient times for them.

In addition, the Video Visitation System has allowed the Maryland Parole Commission to conduct parole hearings remotely so that the Commission can hold hearings in a timely manner with all inmates who are entitled to parole hearings. Prior to the implementation of Video Visitation, the Parole Commission had to travel from Baltimore to Hagerstown to hold parole hearings. This prevented them from holding parole hearings with the inmate in a timely manner as required by law.

11,765 visits were conducted at the Detention Center in 2019!

The Detention Center is required to house inmates having a variety of criminal charges, cultural, social and educational backgrounds, and personal needs. An Initial Classification Interview, an information gathering process is conducted for each inmate. During this process, Classification Counselors assess an inmate's current charges, sentence/bond status, criminal history, medical/mental health history, and housing requirements. Orientation to facility rules and regulations and institutional functions also occurs at this time. Classification Reviews are periodically conducted to determine if modification of an inmate's current status is appropriate. Once compiled, the information is used to assign housing, program access, and in making institutional work assignments. Classification Counselors provide a vital information link between the inmate population, courts, and other judicial system agencies.

## FOOD SERVICES

#### 2019 AT A GLANCE

- Prepared and served a total of 350,657 inmate meals (cost per meal was \$1.538 January-April and \$1.526 May—December)
- Total cost of feeding inmates was \$537,220
- ◆ Served an average of 961 inmate meals per day

In 2018, the Washington County Detention Center awarded a contract to ARAMARK to provide food services to inmates and staff. Food Service operations must comply with all regulatory standards mandated by such agencies as the Maryland State Department of Health and Mental Hygiene and the Maryland Commission on Correction Standards. In addition, all dietary requirements of inmates must be met – medical diets, religious diets, special diets, etc.


